Parkes to Narromine project now commissioned

The Parkes to Narromine section was commissioned in late September 2020 and is now operational.

Deputy Prime Minister Michael McCormack, Federal Member for Parkes Mark Coulton and Parkes Shire Council Mayor Ken Keith, were present at a commissioning ceremony on 15 September during which the Deputy Prime Minister installed the line's final rail clip.

Wiradjuri elder Aunty Rhonda Towney welcomed guests to country for the ceremony which also saw the unveiling of a small plaque alongside the line at Peak Hill.

Local suppliers benefit

Parkes to Narromine saw the upgrade of 98.4km of existing track and the building of 5.3km of new track. Construction used:

- 14,000 tonnes of new rail, supplied by Liberty Steel Whyalla, South Australia
- ▶ 188,000 concrete sleepers made by Rocla in Mittagong
- > 752,000 rail clips from Pandrol, Blacktown
- 360,200 tonnes of ballast with supplies from Parkes-based companies Calvani Crushing and Ausrock Quarries
- ▶ \$13 million worth of culverts weighing 26,625 tonnes from Holcim, Tamworth.

Going with the flow

Completion of the Parkes to Narromine section of Inland Rail has opened several important cross regional freight links connecting the southern/western and north-western rail networks in NSW. These links are now enabling freight transport of:

- mineral concentrates such as copper, silver, lead, zinc from Cobar on the Transport for NSW Country Regional Network, via Narromine and Parkes, to Broken Hill and Port Pirie
- copper and gold concentrates from the North Parkes mine, loaded onto trains at Goonumbla between Parkes and Narromine, headed for export through Port Kembla
- grain from various grain receival facilities on the Narromine-Nyngan line and Parkes to Narromine line at Peak Hill and Tomingley West. This grain is headed to the Parkes grain sub-terminal and on to Port Kembla for export, and to the major mill at Manildra in the NSW Central West for domestic consumption.

The Parkes to Narromine line will also be available as a diversionary route for traffic from the west and south heading to Newcastle and Brisbane, bypassing Sydney when required.

Trains running again in time for harvest season

Trains are running again on the Parkes to Narromine line for the first time in almost two years.

The Australian Rail Track Corporation (ARTC) is one of Australia's largest rail network owners and managers, is managing this first section of Inland Rail to go into operation.

While it will be a few years before the entire 1,700km Inland Rail freight backbone between Melbourne and Brisbane runs at full capacity, locals can increasingly expect to see:

- grain and ore concentrate trains returning to the line
- planned and emergency maintenance activities
- environmental monitoring
- track inspections and patrols.

Trains on the line can travel at up to 115km an hour. We are asking everyone to continue to take extra care at level crossings, especially during the bumper grain harvest season.

Operational noise and vibration impacts have been modelled as part of the EIS process and noise mitigation measures have been put in place. The modelling will be revisited via in-field monitoring once the Melbourne to Brisbane line is running at full capacity to ensure that the implemented mitigation measures are performing. If differences between predicted and recorded flood levels are detected, they will also be addressed with impacted landholders in the same period.

Tasked with modernising rail in Australia, ARTC was established in 1998 to maintain and operate 8,500km of the nation's rail network in five states, managing the transit of around 450 passenger and freight trains per day across New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia and Western Australia.

ARTC has invested more than \$7 billion to deliver key transport infrastructure projects to bolster our national economy and enhance the safety and reliability of our rail network over the past 15 years and is tasked by the Australian Government to build Inland Rail.
